Reading: (LA Standards 3.RN.1, 3.RN.2, 3.RN.3, 3.RN.4, 3.RV.1, 3.RV.2, 3.RF.1, 3.RF.4,

3.RF.5) This week's story is Fly Eagle Fly. It is a folk tale. We will work cause and effect and character traits. There will be homework on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday that will need to be signed by a parent or responsible adult.

Tested Vocabulary: clutched, echoed, gully, reeds, scrambled, thatch, valley



We will have an open book *comprehension quiz* over the story and a *vocabulary quiz* on Friday.

Spelling (LA Standard 3.W.6.2)

The Spelling List 23 this week will be the syllable pattern VCCCV. Students will learn where to split the syllables. Some students have 15 words, some have 20, and some have 25. There will be a trial test on Wednesday and a **final test** on Friday. This is another more difficult list. You can find a copy on the Parent Information page under spelling lists.

English (LA Standard 3.W.6.1)

We will work the grammar skill of prepositions. This is a tough one. I introduced it last week. We will review nouns, verbs, pronouns and basic sentence structure. There will be a grammar quiz on Friday. This is a very tough skill. Students will be allowed to use their grammar journals on the quiz.

<u>Prepositions</u>

A <u>preposition</u> is the first word in a group of words called a prepositional phrase. A <u>prepositional phrase</u> ends with a noun or pronoun called the <u>object of the preposition</u>. A prepositional phrase tells more about the other words in a sentence.

Preposition Prepositional Phrase Object of a Preposition The eagle lived <u>on</u> a cliff. The eagle lived <u>on a cliff</u>. The eagle lived on a <u>cliff</u>.

Science: (Science 3ESS.3, 3.ESS.4)
